Miss Bashid said "I felt happy because the kids have wanted to have a pyjama day at school for a long time". The children and staff wore their pyjamas to school in return for a £1 donation.

Margaret explained the reason why we support this charity, "Maggie's at the Royal Free Hospital, has supported previous parents who have been diagnosed with breast cancer".

Maggie's provides free cancer support and information in centres across the UK and online. The first Maggie's opened in Edinburgh in 1996. Our local centre is a brand new building at the Royal Free Hospital which is due to be completed by autumn 2023.

Also known as Dia de los Muertos, it is a Mexican national holiday celebrated every year during a 3 day festival which lasts from October 31st until 2nd November. It helps families to honour their deceased ancestors. In Mexican culture, death is not taboo as it is in many parts of the world.

Did you know Day of the Dead is over 3000 years old? It combines the ancient Aztec custom of celebrating ancestors with All Souls Day, a holiday that Spanish invaders brought to Mexico in the early 1500s. Day of the Dead is a joyful time that helps people remember the dead and celebrate their lives.





There are big colourful parades, especially in Mexico City, with massive sculptures and amazing creatures which are made from papier mâché, cardboard or wood.

People set up a candlelit altar in their homes so spirits can find their way back to their relatives. The altar offers some of the favourite foods of the dead and Items that were important to the ancestors, such as a favourite book or belonging. During Day of the Dead people can be found in the graveyard cleaning the tombstones of their relatives while eating food, dancing to music and talking to their dead relatives.

British Summer Time

At precisely 2.00am on Sunday, 29th October 2023, the clocks will go back one hour in the UK. The good news is that we'll get another hour in bed, but the bad news is that it'll be getting dark by 4.00pm the following day.

In the UK, Daylight Saving Time came into use in 1916, due to the costs of energy during the war.



An easy way to remember which way the clocks change is to think of the seasons: in spring the clocks 'spring forward', while in autumn they 'fall back'.

A campaign at the beginning of the 20th century argued in favour of changing the clocks during the summer months to avoid wasting time in the morning.

Today people claim that changing the clocks will be good for:

- reducing energy for environmental reasons
- having longer evenings to have fun!
- encouraging people to exercise more outdoors.
- reducing road accidents.

There is also an argument for against daylight savings time:

- The hassle of changing the clocks twice a year
- Safety concerns about darker mornings
- Some farmers worry about the effect of changing routines for the farm animals.
- We don't need to because we spend most of our time in well-lit homes, shops and offices, where the amount of daylight makes little difference to our lives.

Eco-friendly Celebrations

Many people will be carving a pumpkin, but don't just throw out the extra bits! According to one UK study, only 42% of people realise that the fleshy inside of carving pumpkins are good for eating. Time to spread the word and reduce the annual pumpkin waste. You get the most delicious crispy seeds in just 10 minutes. You could also make a warming pumpkin soup. Try these recipes and let us know if you enjoyed them!

Roasted Pumpkin Seeds



Ingredients

- •fresh pumpkin seeds, scooped from the pumpkin
- •2 tsp olive oil

Method

STEP 1Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Wash the seeds thoroughly and remove any stringy bits of pumpkin flesh. Dry well using kitchen paper.

STEP 2Put the seeds on a baking tray and toss with the olive oil. Roast for 10 mins. Serve with a little seasoning for a snack, if you like, or use as a garnish for salads or soups.

Kitchen Safety Rules for Kids

- 1. Ask an adult's permission before cooking.
- 2. Wash hands often with soap and water.
- 3. Start with clean surfaces and clean cooking tools.
- 4. Fasten hair back if it is long.
- 5. Wear a clean apron.

Pumpkin Soup



Ingredients

- •600 g pumpkin flesh, roughly chopped
- •2 celery sticks, roughly chopped
- •1 garlic clove, roughly chopped
- •1 tsp. each ground cumin and coriander
- •800 ml vegetable stock
- •200 ml coconut milk
- •1 tbsp. pumpkin seeds

Method

STEP 1Put the pumpkin flesh into a food processor and whiz for 30sec until almost smooth. Add the celery, garlic and spices and whiz again for 30 seconds. Empty into a large pan.

STEP 2Pour over stock and coconut milk, bring to the boil, then cover and simmer for 15 minutes.

STEP 3Remove from heat and blend until smooth - do this in batches, if necessary. Check the seasoning and ladle into warmed soup bowls. Sprinkle with pumpkin seeds and freshly ground black pepper. Serve with crusty bread.

- 3. The museum is home to one of the oldest clock mechanisms in the world, dating from the 14th century.

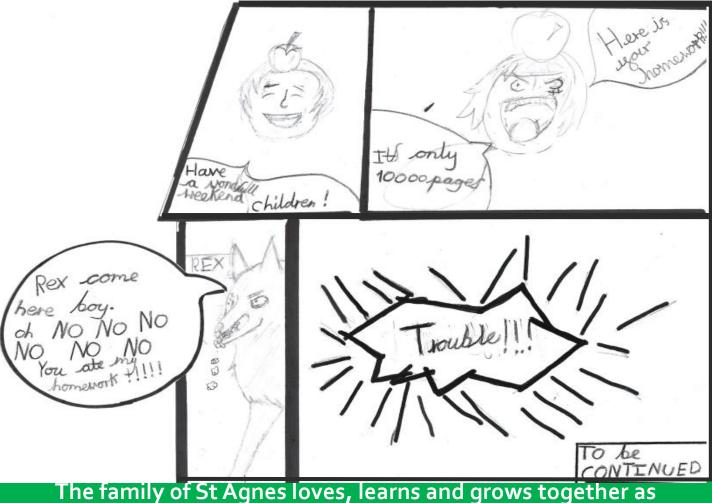
