Parent Forum Reps


Barnet Bar No-One Event

The Year 5 Science Museum by Ashez Rahman

ALTHOUGH it was quite a cold and rainy day, the morale was sky-high. Everyone was buzzing with excitement, as finally, it was the day we were going to the Science Museum!

We entered the museum through the back of the building and as soon as we opened the door, countless historical space exploration objects came into sight. We glided across the floor into the Space Exploration zone and immediately stopped as there was a display of a replica of the Eagle (the vehicle used to land the astronauts, Neil Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins on the Moon in the Apollo 11 mission, 1969).

With our mouths open, we kept walking and we saw a stall that had "IMAX 3 DIMENSIONAL MOVIE". Soon, we found a cinema screen the size of four double-decker buses stacked on top of each other! Suddenly a muffled voice came from the speaker. It said "Take a seat, relax, put your glasses on and prepare for the best space movie!" We looked as if we were in a space pod, moving through the Milky Way until we zoomed into a star, which was the sun. The narrator explained how the Sun was the only habitable star system we have ever found (yet). Then we zoomed into Earth and it explained how beautiful it was. They also showed us how lucky we were to live on such a planet. They zoomed through the atmosphere into the melting glaciers and ice sheets in Antarctica. Then they amplified the ISS satellite and showed how the astronauts arrived, did their project, and left after about 8 months.

One of the major projects were initiated by a botany researcher and a scientist. He grew lettuce in space, which is, important as in the future people will inhabit distant planets and grow crops there. Lastly, it showed us how they celebrated Christmas, drank expressos and got their resources (through little pods arriving from Australia and Japan). After eating our lunch, we explored the space gallery and saw some out-of-this world objects such as rockets, satellites, probes and landers. We arrived at Cricklewood station soon enough, and headed back to our school. We thanked the parents and got picked up around 15 minutes later.

What Schools Need to Know about

THE ONLINE SAFETY ACT

WHAT THE ACT WILL DO The Online Safety Act was passed into UK law in October 2023, with the aim of establishing major new layers of protection for children when they're online. The government has pledged "a zero-tolerance approach to protecting children from online harm?", and the act certainly includes more powerful legislation which should help to safeguard young people in the digital world. Our guide summarises the key points for schools ...

HARMFUL CONTENT

Social media sites must repidly remove illegal and for harmful content such as bullying or harassing comments; parnography; and content that supports extremist activity or encaurages or depicts violence, suicide, self harm or eating disorders. If they fall to do so, they can be fined up to 10% of their global revenue while their executives may even lean inditine.

ANIMAL CRUELTY

Content featuring cruelty to animals is now prohibited, even if it originates from abroad (where the law may be different Again, it is the platform's responsibility to remove this.

MORE TRANSPARENCY

Sites must be transparent about the hazards that any children using them could encounter – by publishing risk assessments for their platforms, for instance.

HOSTING MISLEADING ADVERTS

Scams and fraudulent adverts must be blocked or removed, or the hosting companies are liable to be fin-

NON-CONSENSUAL SHARING

It's now assier to convict online abusers or people who share intimate images without consent, while legislation on the criminality of deopfakes has been clarified. The new lows also relate to any individuals who even threaten to share such images. This should help to protect women and girls

REPORTING AND FILTERING

Sites should have easy reporting mechanisms for children (or their parents and carers) to flag up problems quickly. They must also provide options to filter out unwanted content.

AGE-RESTRICTED

Sites must prevent children from accessing age—inappropriate material. This includes enforcing age limits and implementing robust

What this means for you

The act has some specific implications for schools: it's essential that leaders understand the new legislation's scope and limitations. The act is certainly a positive step, but as artificial intelligence and other advances in tech continue to produce new challenges, schools will still need to remain extremely vigilant

KNOW WHERE TO GET HELP

Look out for the Code of Conduct that Ofcom is creating in response to the Online Safety Act. Note that the new legislation deem't mean an instant change: many of its elements will only come into force at the end of 2023. An Ofcom consultation or protecting people from illegal harms online' will be running until February 2024.

REMEMBER THE ESSENTIALS

Remain mindful of your organisation's own online activities: the legal duty for schools to maintain appropriate software monitoring and filtering, for example, will not change.

WATCH FOR FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

There are some issues on which the legislation remains less clear for now: whether it's possible for Olcom to econ encrypted private messages (such as on WhatsApp) has yet to be resolved, for instance – making this an area where, for the moment, young people have less level protections.

UNDERSTAND AND EXPLAIN

Staff should learn how to raise concerns with tech companies whose platforms contain anything upsetting or unpleasant. Students also need to be made aware of the newly strengthened laws relating to cyber-builtying, setting or posting inappropriate content. Young people do make mistakes online — so the clearer their understanding of the possible consequences, the better.

ENGAGE WITH PARENTS

Schools should also explain to parents and carers the new possibilities that the Online Safety Act affords them in terms of protecting their children. Many parents may have previously felt that there was little they could do about changing online platforms' content; they now have a far greater level of support when complaining about a company or the benevious of an individual.
