

Have you ever heard of Alexa or Siri? Have you ever wondered how iPhone's face recognition works? All of these technologies have something in commonthey use artificial intelligence or "Al."


Artificial intelligence is the ability for a computer to think and learn. With AI, computers can perform tasks that are typically done by people.



Computer scientists predict artificial intelligence will be even more prominent in the future.

Chat GPT is an essay writing program that was released late last year by the company OpenAI, founded by Elon Musk. It is already well known and widely used across the word. It can generate a 500 word essay in less than 30 seconds. It is being used by students for homework and online tasks, This might affect humans as they become lazy and sluggish because they rely on AI. On the other hand, many people support the extensive use of it, as it provides explanations on more complex topics and be used as a virtual teacher.

In the USA, engineers have already created an Al-powered humanoid robot prototype called SOPHIA. One of the more widely known humanoid robots, It has facial features and can simulate human expressions to show emotions.



Sophia can process visual, emotional and conversational data.

SOPHIA has travelled the world, been on the cover of magazines and addressed the United Nations. It also has a particularly sharp sense of humour and joked about taking over the world.

Another concern about AI is that if robots and computers become very intelligent, they could learn to do jobs and replace humans, leaving some unemployed. AI is expected to replace 85 million jobs worldwide by 2025. Doctors use AI to diagnose patients based on medical scans, like X-rays.

For technology to continue to advance, we need resources and energy. If we keep using oil, coal, radioactive/ nuclear components and fossil fuels we will run out of those energy producers very soon. These resources also emit carbon dioxide when used in the production of energy so it would also affect us due to climate change and our carbon footprint.

There are only a handful of bank holidays left in 2023. For England, Wales and Northern Ireland, there are two in December- Christmas Day (25th) and also Boxing Day (26th).

Bamboo bon voyage!

Male panda Yang Guang translates to 'sunshine' from Chinese

Britain's two giant pandas, the only pair in the country, munched bamboo stalks in front of crowds at Edinburgh Zoo for the final time on Thursday 30th November. Yang Guang and Tian Tian came to Edinburgh in 2011 as part of a ten-year agreement between the Royal Zoological Society of Scotland (RZSS) and the China Wildlife Conservation Association (CWCA). The deal was extended for two years due to the pandemic.

It had been hoped female panda Tian Tian and male Yang Guang would breed while they were at the zoo, but they weren't able to produce a cub.

In the October half-term, I had the privilege to travel to Edinburgh to visit the famous pair of giant pandas. On my visit I found out some interesting facts to share with you.

Although giant pandas are called "giant," they are actually the second-smallest bear species. Pandas are very popular as they are very cute and cuddly, however they have very sharp claws. If you try to give a giant pada a cuddle, it's probably the last one you're going to get..!

The word panda translates from the Nepali word "ponya," meaning "bamboo eater" or "bamboo footed." At Edinburgh Zoo, the pandas were fed about 50kg each of bamboo every day. You get the same amount of nutrition from cardboard, which is why they have to eat so much of it! Pandas are herbivores. Even though bamboo makes up for 95% of their diet, the other 5% is meat. If a small rodent was to scuttle past, it would get gobbled up! Pandas have an extra finger or "false thumbs" which is simply for the use of grasping bamboo.

The giant pandas 12-year stay has come to an end and they have returned home to China. Zookeepers have spent the last few weeks making sure the two pandas became used to crates in preparation for their long journey, expected at some point in early December. "They're China's national treasure" said Mr McGarry, head of living collections RZSS, which runs the zoo.

Melting snowman biscuit



Ingredients

- 200g fondant icing sugar
- •6 white marshmallows
- •6 large cookies
- •24 mini chocolate beans
- •6 pretzel sticks
- tube black writing icing

STEP 1 Add a teaspoon at a time of cold water to the icing sugar until the mixture is runny but thick enough to coat a spoon.

STEP 2 Ask an adult to snip the marshmallows in half using wet scissors. STEP 3 Spoon a little icing onto each cookie and attach half a marshmallow. Drizzle a little more icing onto the

STEP 4 Place the pretzel sticks on the cookie for arms. Stick orange chocolate buttons on for the noses. Stick three chocolate buttons.

STEP 5 Pipe small dots of the writing icing, for the eyes and mouth. Leave to set.

Hot Chocolate Buddy



Ingredients

- •3 regular sized marshmallows
- tube black writing icing
- pretzel sticks
- Any small (orange) sweets

STEP 1 Squeeze on eyes and a mouth to one marshmallow using your black writing icing. Cut a slit in the middle and press in a sweet for the nose. Cut another slit in the backside and press the marshmallow on the edge of your mug.

STEP 2 Add 2 dots of icing to another marshmallow and press 2 pretzel sticks in the sides.

STEP 3 Add another dot of icing on your last marshmallow and press in 2 pretzel sticks to the bottom. Place them in your mug and watch your snowman relax in his hot cocoa bath.

Ingredients

- •250ml milk of your choice
- •1 tbsp cocoa
- •1-2 tbsp soft light brown sugar

Heat the milk, cocoa and sugar in a small pan over a medium heat until steaming. Whisk to dissolve the cocoa.

TIP: Using the pan and a whisk method instead of the microwave will get the lumps to mix in.
